



# French Continuers

## What is French Continuers?

The language to be studied and assessed is modern standard French.

Although the focus of study will be the French spoken in metropolitan France, students may also encounter French spoken in other French-speaking countries. Students should be aware of different levels of language, for example, formal, informal, some colloquialisms, and slang. Students are expected to know that dialects exist; however, they are not required to study them.

## Why study French Continuers?

The study of French contributes to the overall education of students, particularly in the areas of communication, cross-cultural understanding, literacy, and general knowledge. Students gain the ability to communicate with the wider Australian community and:

- Our South Pacific neighbours (New Caledonia, Tahiti, Vanuatu);
- South-East Asia (Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam);
- Europe (France, Switzerland, Belgium, Luxembourg);
- Africa (Morocco, Senegal, Tunisia);
- The Middle East;
- The Indian Ocean region (Madagascar, Mauritius, Reunion Island);
- Canada;
- The West Indies.

French is also an official language for the Olympic Games, the United Nations, the European Union, the South Pacific Commission, the Organisation for African Unity, and international conferences.

Knowledge of French may be an advantage in seeking employment in many fields such as the arts, banking and international finance, commerce, cuisine and catering, diplomacy, education and research, fashion and cosmetics, government, hospitality (e.g. hotels, restaurants), the law, the media (e.g. journalism), science and technology, tourism (e.g. airlines), translating and interpreting, and winemaking.

The study of French enhances enjoyment and appreciation of French culture through film, literature, music, cuisine, art, and sport.

## Course content of French Continuers

### Course Work

Topics include youth issues, family, a French film, multicultural France and the environment. Activities include written and aural text analysis in French, written and oral tasks in French, simple discussions in French, grammar exercises and the study of video clips, films and music.

### Investigative Task

The topics are a Francophone city in Semester 1 and a prominent French-speaking person in Semester 2. Students research the topic and present an oral using PowerPoint or Photo Story 3 and a written text of 250 words in English.

## Assessment Components

Assessment in French Continuers consists of the following components, weighted as shown:

### Assessment Component 1:

- Oral Task (Interaction) 20%

### Assessment Component 2:

- Written Task (Text Production) 20%

### Assessment Component 3:

- Text Analysis Task 20%

### Assessment Component 4:

- Investigative Task 40%

## Learning Requirements of the Course

At the end of the program in Stage 1 French, students should be able to:

- Exchange information, opinions, and experiences in French;
- Express ideas through the production of original texts in French;
- Analyse, process, and respond to texts that are in French;
- Understand aspects of the language and culture of French-speaking communities.

Meeting these learning outcomes will involve using the macro skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing, either individually or in combination, and being able to move between French and English.

## Future Pathways in French

The study of Stage 1 French Continuers gives students the opportunity to gain a range of employment and life skills, for example, the ability, understanding, and confidence to communicate with others across cultures. The study of French at Stage 1 also provides a suitable preparation for the study of French at Stage 2, and is a pathway to further study and training.
