Sport at Trinity College

Overview

When we discuss the nature of holistic and well-rounded education we must include the physical development of our students. Participation in sport is an obvious way the physical element of child development can be experienced.

Through our sporting programmes, students at Trinity College are exposed to the lessons of teamwork and the values of fairness. They are exposed to loss as well as success; courage as well as fear, excellence as well as mediocrity. Our sporting programme offers wonderful and unique opportunities to educate in the fullest sense of that term. As an educational institution we are best placed to provide that fundamental educational link between the body and education in a meaningful manner.

To respond effectively to this aspect of our educational mission we must have confidence that these opportunities for growth are understood and taken on board by those involved in coaching and or managing teams. Because our teachers commit themselves to this aspect of our mission we have a remarkable pool of educational experience to call upon. As a response to our review of sport at Trinity we have committed resources to increasing the profile, coaching standards and facilities to ensure that the best programmes possible are offered to all students.

One of the distinguishing features of our College as opposed to other schools in the northern region both State and Independent, is the comprehensive programme we offer and the convenience and security this provides for parents. We wish to continue to provide that point of difference and reaffirm that offering a comprehensive sporting programme at Trinity College is critical to meeting our College aims.

The Sports Governance Policy

The College Council has the responsibility for the macro policies of the College. The importance of sport in the life of the College is acknowledged through the following policy which serves as the bedrock of operational decisions about the development of sport.

It is important to note that the College Council, whose primary responsibility is to safeguard the foundational aims of the College, require a vibrant sporting programme to ensure that all students will have the opportunity to develop their physical abilities and potential while at school.

The Council Policy is stated thus:

Trinity College has a proud sporting tradition and recognizes the unique value of sport in our society.

The policy of this Council is:

- sport is an integral part of a balanced curriculum of education at Trinity College, providing a key role in training for life, developing physical skills and discipline, and in promoting a healthy, positive lifestyle
- sport is an opportunity for the development of positive and rewarding relationships between students, staff and parents
- all students are encouraged to participate to their level of ability

Trinity College will provide a variety of sporting opportunities to encourage maximum participation and enjoyment.

To encourage excellence, the College recognises that some opportunities are best offered by external sporting clubs and associations, however the College will provide regular opportunities for participation by all students, to the level of ability and commitment appropriate for each student as may be possible.

Since sport provides an opportunity for interface to the wider community, it is the policy of this College that sport shall be undertaken in a manner and spirit reflecting the aims of the College.

Constitutional Basis

2. AIMS

- (a) to foster in every student a desire to serve God and humanity; to develop a respect for truth and a lasting set of moral values and to acquire the greatest possible understanding of self and the worth of each individual's contribution to Society;
- (b) to develop fully the spiritual, social, academic and physical potential of each student in a caring yet disciplined environment;
- (f) to help each student appreciate the joy of living;



The Sports Operational Policy

The operational policy of the College has been developed to ensure that the Council's overall strategic goals are met. While this operational policy may change from time to time, it is primarily designed to enact a programme to a point where a balance of mass participation and individual potential is maintained. The operational policy takes into consideration the needs of local clubs and associations, leagues and organisation, all of whom have particular requirements with regard to membership.

The Sports Association for Adelaide Schools is an excellent association for organised school sport across a variety of secondary sports and is a key association of which the College is a member. It has a well formulated constitution which articulates requirements for membership. Schools wishing to participate in this association are required to be involved in a minimum of three sports in each season, Summer and Winter. This means that the College must have a level of breadth in our sporting offerings to allow this to occur.

The College belongs to other sporting associations where they provide a level of organisation and support that is suitable to the College. These are particularly evident in the junior and girls sporting programmes and programmes where SAAS does not provide adequate coverage.

The responsiveness of these leagues and associations to local concerns is an important issue for our College. As a College living on the urban fringe we are aware that we have to relate both to our city and country neighbours. For example; SAAS's scheduling of soccer matches are as early as possible on Saturday morning to allow students to participate in their local teams and associations and the Gawler and Barossa Valley Hockey Association have allowed Trinity College to field College teams in their league. These and other accommodations like them across all sports have ensured that where possible students are able to undertake many sporting experiences both within and beyond the College.

The College Operational Policy

All students who attend Trinity College and wish to play a sport the College offers are required to play for the College. There are a range of sports on offer at the College that involve both mid-week afternoon, evening and Saturday fixtures. We participate in the best competitions available for our students and have built an enviable reputation as a school that offers sporting excellence. These competitions are a mixture of local leagues, Independent School competitions, and association divisions.

The competitions students participate in depend on the sport they choose. We frequently review our competitions to ensure that students are participating in the best programme possible.

Exemption from playing sport for the College is happily given on the following grounds:

1. Your child plays a sport the College does not offer and regularly participates in that sport.
2. Non-selection in College teams due to a surplus of players as determined by the coach.
3. Those occasions your child is representing their sport at an elite level in the opinion of the College. e.g. Reserves SANFL, B Grade district cricket (please note these are examples only and the same elite participation occurs across all sports)
4. Cases determined on an individual basis due to exceptional circumstances.

Exemptions must be applied for in writing to the Head of Sport.

Exemptions for winter sports must reach the Head of Sport before the end of March. Exemptions for summer sports must reach the Head of Sport before the end of August.

Parents should note that exemptions will not be granted on the basis of commitments to local clubs and teams unless the commitment falls into the categories above. The school term dates and holiday breaks do allow participation time in local competitions and in the case of finals enough time for qualification. The College has also encouraged mid-week fixtures to support local competitions where possible.

Students must play for Trinity College teams to be eligible for SAPSASA, SAAS, SSSSA or any other school sector representative teams. Students must play for Trinity College teams to be eligible for College teams in the Schools' Knockout competitions.

Code of Behaviour

The following is a set of guidelines to assist teachers, coaches, students and parents, to enable them to get the maximum benefit from sport and to encourage good sportsmanship.

1. Each individual should give a reasonable time each week to training in order to maintain a balance with time allocated to study, religious activities, home duties, cultural enjoyment and social activities.
2. All the courtesies should be observed: teams must be punctual; the coach and captain of the home team should receive the visiting team members courteously and show them to the change rooms; there should be early notification of the inability to field teams.
3. Play may be hard and vigorous in body contact sports but never deliberately foul or unfair. A player using deliberate violence should be removed by his coach before it becomes necessary for the umpire to take action.
4. Behaviour on and off the field must be modest and restrained.
 - (a) Bad language is not to be tolerated (a player offending in this way should be removed by coach or umpire).
 - (b) Barracking should be enthusiastic, but never belittling nor provocative, nor should it be designed to upset the opponents – or encourage rough play, or over-praise an individual.
 - (c) A team (or individual) that wins should behave modestly. A team that is defeated or an individual who makes an error, should not make a display of his self-disgust or disappointment.
 - (d) Good play should be recognised, whether by an opponent or a member of one's own school.
 - (e) The umpire's decisions must be accepted without negative response by players, coaches and spectators.
 - (f) Unfair tactics must never be used. This includes the use of provocative comments of a personal nature.
5. Home schools should show courtesy to visiting spectators as well as players, and visitors must respect the host school's premises and rules in matters of parking, tidiness, access to playing areas, change rooms, use of alcohol, etc.

In team games, each Trinity team should acknowledge the efforts of their opponents with a handshake and "three cheers" called by the captain. Umpires should be acknowledged likewise with "three cheers" from the team and thanked personally by the captain.

Each Trinity team should be

"Modest in Victory and Generous in Defeat".

Organisational structure

The structure of sport at Trinity College is as follows:

The Head of Sport: Mr Richard Bednall is responsible for the sporting programme as a whole and he ensures that all sports are conducted in the manner that their associations and leagues require as well as to the standards that Trinity College expects. Mr Bednall is responsible for staffing sport, liaising about resource needs and developing policies. He is also responsible for ensuring the sports policy is followed and any exemptions must be sought through him. If there are any contraventions to stated policies and procedures Mr Bednall investigates and adjudicates on such matters.

Sports Administrator: Ms Christine Murray is responsible for the day-to-day administration of the sports programme. This involves the "leg work" of the programme including setting fixtures, communicating changes, managing equipment and resources, co-ordinating facilities and supporting teams who need help.

Coordinator of Individual Sports: Each sport, e.g. Tennis, has a coordinator. The coordinator is responsible for managing the needs of all teams who play in each association and league. They are responsible for coordinating coaches, students and parents and work closely with the Sports Administrator and Head of Sport to ensure that the College's and communities expectations of our programme are maintained. In all cases the co-ordinator is a point of contact for students, parents and staff who have specific sport issues to be managed that are beyond the remit of the team coach.

Head Coach: The College has developed the role of Head Coach for those sports that require an injection of expertise. This role is taken by a leading exponent of the sport who has coached and/or played at the highest levels. The Head Coach has three primary roles. The first is to develop a consistent coaching programme across all teams in the sport. The second role is to mentor coaches into that programme and liaise regularly with them to ensure that expectations are being met. Thirdly, the Head Coaches make themselves available for coaching elite players identified across all year levels.

Our Head Coaches are not staff at the College, although in some sports our own expertise allows us to combine a coordination and Head Coach role. In most cases Head Coaches come from the broader sporting community and have demonstrated skills and qualifications in their sport to a very high level.

Coaches: Our coaches are in the majority of cases trained to a minimum of level 1 in the sport they coach. They are responsible for the development of individual teams and manage the needs of the team they coach. Coaches, depending on the numbers in each sport, come from the staff, old scholars, parents, and community sporting organisations. The coaches are the key person parents and students will relate to on a weekly basis and any communication about student participation in a team should be directed to the coach in the first instance.

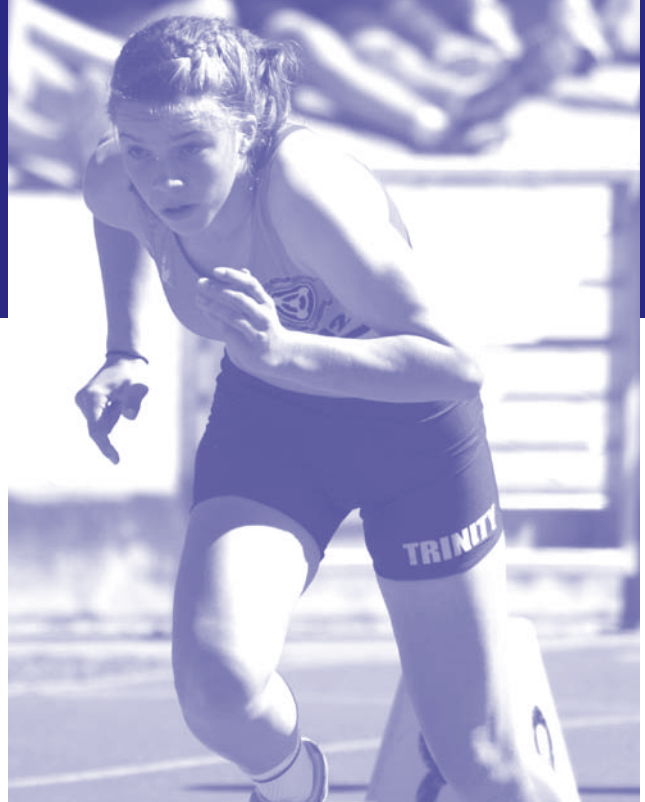
Coaches' Duties – Supervision of Sport

Administrative Responsibilities

- Concern must be given at all times for the welfare and safety of the students in their care
- Report any breaches of the code of conduct, poor discipline and behaviour to the coordinator of the sport.
- Where there is no official umpire/scorer, ensure an umpire and scorer is available
- Expect from your team respect for all officials and opposition players
- Arrange the taking of a team photo and send copy to Head of Sport
- Provide final teams' lists to the Sports Administrator for fee purposes
- Select and post teams well in advance of weekends

Match Days

- The Coach is to be at the game 30 minutes prior to the game start
- Welcome and direct visitors when playing at home
- Ensure all players are wearing the correct uniform
- Ensure all players are given equal opportunity to play
- Talk to the players at least prior to and shortly after the game/event
- Ensure all players shake hands with the opposition at the end of the games
- Where coaches cannot attend training or matches please notify the Coordinator of the Sport and together find a suitable replacement
- Where training or matches are adversely affected by weather the coach must remain with the team until the end of the scheduled finishing time or until the last player has been collected
- Send scores and other match details with a brief report to the Sports Administrator and to the Coordinator of the Sport as soon as possible



Other Sporting Responsibilities

- Distribute program of matches to players and parents
- Arrange necessary equipment (liaise with Sports Administrator) and then care for game and training equipment. Report any lost or damaged equipment to the Coordinator of the sport
- Where necessary open and close/lock change rooms when playing at home
- Attend all training sessions punctually, account for all registered students and ensure all students to wear appropriate dress
- See the Sports Administrator for first aid kits for matches and training

Safety

Each of the leagues and associations that the College plays in and for have specific regulations regarding player safety, the preparation of venues and codes of conduct. In accordance with SAAS regulations, Trinity College has a manned St John's vehicle at winter Saturday sport, based at the Gawler site.

Each team coach is equipped with a first aid kit for administering low level first aid. All coaches are encouraged to notify parents, ambulance services and hospitals in the case of injuries they are not able to manage on site. All coaches have a phone or easy access to a phone to make emergency calls.

The College does have insurance coverage for students participating in College sanctioned sporting fixtures. Information on the nature and extent of this coverage can be obtained from the College Bursar.

A written report is made on any significant injury and is passed on to the Head of Sport to ensure that all appropriate steps have been taken.

Any concerns regarding student safety should be discussed with the Head of Sport.

Facilities

Trinity College has outstanding playing facilities across a range of sports. STARplex provides exceptional home ground facilities for indoor sports such as basketball and swimming. We have a dedicated oval for athletics and softball, and facilities for football, soccer; turf, indoor and hard wicket cricket, netball and tennis. We have built new change-room facilities for the Waldeck Oval. A synthetic hockey pitch and a grandstand are projects under consideration. All of our surfaces are maintained regularly and without exception are first class.

Not all of the venues that our students play at are as well equipped and in the spirit of sportsmanship and understanding we are cautious not to make unrealistic demands on other providers and encourage our facilities to be used to their full capacity.

The College does have changing and toilet facilities available for players and visiting teams. In most cases students choose to come to games prepared to play and return home after the game to wash. In senior teams such as first and second XVIII football and first and second XI cricket there are facilities available for pre and post match preparation. We are encouraging senior teams to have sports medicine support and any interest you may have in being involved in such a manner can be passed on to Mr Bednall, the Head of Sport.

Range of Sports

Trinity currently offers 10 individual and team sports in our programme. In order to ensure that the majority of students have access to a sport of their liking, we have chosen diverse and plentiful options. The College also conducts an equestrian programme. Partnerships have been formed with key providers such as the Independent Schools Sports Association, Secondary Schools Sports South Australia, South Australian Primary School Sports Association and a number of local associations.

Presentation Nights

Each sport holds an annual presentation night for students, parents and coaches. This evening is designed to highlight the highs and lows of the season, to thank those associated with making the season a success, and to present trophies to individuals for excelling in different aspects of the game.

The coordinator of the individual sport is responsible for organising the evening and the numerical size of the sport will dictate the appropriate venue. Parents can expect team members to take information home about the date and time of the evening.

Communication

Each individual sports coordinator has the task of communicating effectively with parents about fixtures, venues, times and general issues concerning the sport for the season. This is done at the beginning of each season. This communication will be forwarded to parents via the team coach and then on to participating students.

The team coach is responsible for ongoing communication and should be used in the first instance for any matters concerning the team. The coach is responsible for the supervision of team members and their conduct, the venue and safety.

During the course of the season there are times when changes to venues, times and fixtures occur at short notice. This is generally out of the College's control and is caused by issues such as weather, player numbers, illness and so on. In the event that changes are made, the College will endeavour to contact all effected parents in a timely manner. The Sports Administrator will affix last minute changes to the College Web Site and we would encourage all parents and students to check the site to double check scheduling.

Student involvement in sport and the posting of results and performances are done through individual school newsletters and on the College Web Site. Mention is also made at each school assembly of the success or otherwise of student performances in the sporting programme. Teams and individuals who have excelled are also mentioned in the College periodical journal, "Trinity Times".



Sporting Excellence

In some sports there has been a tradition of sporting trips to allow representative players to experience playing teams from around Australia and the world. Currently for example, we have annual Cricket fixtures against Kormilda College from Darwin, Woodcroft College and Ballarat Grammar. Both the 1st XVIII football team and the Open Girls netball team were involved in an exchange with Ballarat Grammar during 2009. Two netball teams also competed in an international tournament on the Gold Coast in 2009.

Many other sports have the opportunity to participate in National competitions on the basis of the success of their team. For the past three years the Open Boys' basketball team has competed in the National Schools' competition held last year in Newcastle. The College has represented South Australia at the National Knockout Athletics Championships in 14 of the past 15 years.

Individual Sports

Individual students also participate in National and International competitions. We have had the pleasure of seeing many fine sporting achievements in sports as varied as "in line" skating, BMX racing, Paralympics and surf life-saving.

No student is held back from achieving their potential in an individual sport. In the case of students who participate in elite level squads and teams, the College gives them enormous encouragement. The Trinity College Foundation is also instrumental in supporting individual and team excellence through their Foundation Awards.

College Awards

Blues & Pockets

These are awarded to students in recognition of outstanding contribution to the College in sporting or cultural activities.

College Blues recognise a higher level of achievement and a longer term of commitment than pockets. Both awards have an individual excellence component and a community service component. Names are forwarded from staff to coordinators of the activity and to the Head of Sport who together with the Principal of the School adjudicates the merit of the nomination.

Pockets

- May be awarded during Semester 2 of Year 10 or later
- The blazer pocket is embroidered with the name of the sport or cultural activity (this may be an abbreviation)
- Students need to demonstrate a greater than expected contribution to the activity in line with the GENERAL definitions. Reliability, attendance, punctuality, courteousness, team contribution and code of behaviour will be taken into account

Blues

- May be awarded to students of Year 11 or Year 12 at a formal awards assembly
- The blazer pocket has a Trinity tri-colour band sewn on to the top with corresponding inscription (if this has not already been done through a pocket)
- Students need to demonstrate a contribution to the activity at the highest level and satisfy the GENERAL definitions listed above. As well as reliability, attendance, punctuality, courteousness, team contribution and code of behaviour; skill level, peer respect, leadership, role-modelling and assistance with the organisation and management of the activity, will be considered.
