# Trinity 2 Cambodia 2019

Information for interested students and their families.





Another Trinity to Cambodia trip is

being planned for December 2019. An amazing opportunity to visit the beautiful country of Cambodia with the genuine purpose of providing meaningful support to local people.

This year the College will team with different organisations including the 2h Project, MAG International, Friends International and Phare Ponleu Selpak Performing Arts School, supporting the projects they are involved with on the ground in Cambodia. A trip such as this will help shape the lives of the students involved, motivating them to remain globally aware, and be locally active.

Our students became advocates for these organisations, playing a role in spreading the word about what they do and why. In preparation for the trip, students will meet together during the year developing their understanding of Cambodia, it's Ancient and Modern History, the aid organisations we will be supporting, social justice and mission.

An aim of the trip is to foster for the students, an understanding of what it means to "think globally and act locally", to support others not in a superficial way, but in an ongoing and sustainable one. It is a way to learn about how NGO's operate – empowering local people to become self-sufficient – ultimately supporting themselves and their families. The trip will give each student an opportunity to bring together skills, character strengths and the other values they have been exposed to and developed during their time at the College, using them in a very real and practical way. It will further enhance the PERMA model (positive emotion, engagement, relationships, meaning and accomplishment) that has been a focus of the Positive Education programme at the College. The hope is that the trip may give students a sense of purpose and direction for how they can contribute and help others in a variety of capacities during their final years at Trinity, and then in the future when they leave school.

In Cambodia, the team will visit and support a range of poverty alleviating projects. Visiting Angkor Wat, the Killing Fields and the Toul Sleng Genocide Museum will enable them to learn about the incredible history and social justice issues of this developing country.

The students are required to cover all their own personal expenses, including travel, accommodation and food costs (approx \$3,400). In addition, each student is asked to fundraise a minimum of \$1000 which will support the projects they will be visiting. It is a rewarding experience seeing how the hard-earnt fundraising money is used in the Country.

One project students will be involved with is the 2h Sight to Life project based at the Battambang Ophthalmic Clinic (BOC). This will be an incredible opportunity to witness people having a new chance to see! In a few hours up to 60 people have their eye sight tested, the health of their eyes checked, and an assessment made for their suitability for treatment of cataracts or pterygium eye conditions. The students will be trained to help the BOC staff screen villagers in rural and remote villages. They will then follow these people back to Battambang for their admission to the clinic and watch a surgical procedure that takes 15 minutes but actually adds years of quality living. According to World Health Organisation (WHO) studies, on average, people blinded by cataract in developing nations die within 4 years of becoming blind. Currently 300 eye surgeries are being performed every month and the team are on target to clear the cataract backlog in Battambang.

A visit to the Phare Ponleu Selpak Performing Arts School will be a highlight of the trip. Trinity students will deliver much needed supplies, teach health and hygiene lessons to the Preschool students and join in workshops and activities at the school.

There will be the opportunity to learn about how micro finance programmes work and meet recipients of these ventures.

We plan to spend time on the ground with MAG International, learning more about the work they do that enables communities to have greater safety and the opportunity to rebuild their lives, livelihoods and futures after the devastation of the war.

**In Phnom Penh we spend a day with Friends International** whose programmes help families achieve sustainable financial security, focus on child protection, reduce child labour and increase reintegration of marginalized children and youth into school and training.

By partnering with these organisations, we will expose and introduce our students to a reputable aid organisation that provide long term, sustainable responses to improving the lives of vulnerable people.

Total Cost: - \$3,400 (approximate cost)


