

Trinity College 1st XVIII Indigenous Guernsey



"In this Guernsey I have incorporated the Trinity lion and Trinity colours.

On the front of the guernsey there are four medium sized circles and one large circle in the middle and they all represent the meeting places.

These meeting places symbolize the four different campuses, Gawler River, Blakeview, South and North and the large one represents Senior school where all the campuses meet and join together.

In the bottom left circle is a bit about me, there is the river to represent my campus Gawler River, there's also a mountain symbol as I have connections to the Adnyamathanha people in the Flinders Ranges which means mountains. I also have strong connections to the Narungga people of the Yorke Peninsula and that means campsite. I have put the Kangaroo symbol in red because that is a Kurna dreaming story called Tandanya and also goanna tracks because they are native and found in Kurna land.

In the bottom right meeting place I have put a campsite with people sitting around and the tracks of emus, crows, goannas, snakes and the kangaroo as we all the share the land together.

In the middle right meeting place I have the Gawler River running through and all the animals drinking and coming together and a male with a spear is hunting them.

On the middle meeting place the 27 red dots around on the inside of the circle represent the 27 indigenous students in the College. In the middle of the meeting place there is a campsite with two adults and two children which represent the coaches and the players sitting around together.

In the top left meeting place is the Aboriginal flag representing the land we are on and acknowledging the Aboriginal people.

Finally on the back of the Guernsey is the Wokali, the Wokali is a traditional Kurna shield."
